In Order of Conference Appearance

Learning from the Past, Shaping a Brighter Future: Technological Transformations in EMS

This session explores the remarkable journey of Emergency Medical Services (EMS) from its visionary beginnings to the cutting-edge technologies shaping its future. Drawing from historical milestones and lessons learned, we will trace the evolution of EMS, including pivotal figures like Peter Safar and Nancy Caroline and the challenges that arose from fragmented federal efforts.

Building on this foundation, the session will focus on the rapid technological advancements transforming EMS, including the role of artificial intelligence in operations, the advent of autonomous ambulances, and other innovations redefining patient care and operational efficiency. These technologies offer both opportunities and challenges, and their integration requires visionary leadership, strategic planning, and a clinician-centered approach. Attendees will leave with actionable insights into how to balance historical lessons, technological opportunities, and leadership strategies to create a sustainable, resilient EMS system that embraces change while staying true to its compassionate roots.

At the conclusion of the session, attendees will:

1. Identify key figures and legislative actions that contributed to the formation of modern EMS practices.
2. Describe the recent challenges faced by EMS, including technological disruptions, and discuss their implications for policy and practice.
3. Understand the capabilities and limitations of AI, autonomous ambulances, and other innovations in EMS operations.
4. Develop leadership strategies for integrating technology while maintaining a clinician-centric and patient-focused approach.
5. Recognize the historical lessons that can inform future innovations and leadership in EMS.

Donnie Woodyard, MAML, NRP - donnie.woodyard@emscompact.gov

Donnie Woodyard, Jr. serves as the Executive Director of the EMS Compact, where he leads national efforts to streamline and enhance emergency medical services personnel practice across state lines. With over 30 years of experience in emergency medical services, including a decade of international experience in war, disaster, and system development, Donnie has held pivotal roles such as State Emergency Medical Services Director in two states and Chief Operating Officer of the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians.

He is also the author of two best-selling books on emergency medical services and technology. Donnie holds a certificate in Artificial Intelligence from Harvard Medical School, is a graduate of the Naval Postgraduate School's Executive Leaders Program and earned an MA in Leadership & Management. A recognized expert in emergency medical services regulation and practice, he contributes to national policy through his work with the Interstate Commission for Emergency Medical Services Personnel Practice. Donnie's passion for enhancing patient outcomes through cutting edge technology makes him a sought-after speaker and thought leader in the field.

Neuroprotective (Heads Up) CPR

Neuroprotective (Heads Up) CPR is an emerging method of resuscitation that involves gradually elevating the head and chest during CPR, along with the use of specific devices. This approach has been shown to help lower pressure in the brain, improve blood flow to the brain, and may lead to better neurological outcomes for cardiac arrest patients. Early findings from both animal and human studies are promising, especially in out-of-hospital settings.

This presentation gives a brief explanation on the physiology of Neuroprotective CPR and how Superstition Fire & Medical District implemented the EleGARD device and its outcomes. The objectives are to learn about Neuroprotective CPR, how to implement the appropriate devices, and its possible outcomes for patient care.

Tanner Fox - tanner.fox@sfmd.az.gov

Tanner Fox's fire service career began in 2005 at the age of 28. He is originally from Sahuarita Arizona, south of Tucson. During his career he has had the privilege of serving the community as a firefighter, Engineer, Captain, and now as a Battalion Chief. Along with working at Superstition Fire & Medical District, he has also worked as an Emergency Room tech for 15 plus years at Dignity Health. He has been married for 22 years to his beautiful wife, and they have four amazing children.

Ice & Cold Water Immersion Treatment for Hyperthermic Patients in the Prehospital Setting

The Phoenix Fire Department developed a treatment guideline with the necessary equipment and training for heat stroke patients in a prehospital setting to mitigate heat related deaths in the City of Phoenix. This guideline was developed by firefighters with our medical direction team of physicians after the summer of 2023 when the state of Arizona Department of Health documented over 600 fatalities.

Our guideline, training standard, and equipment have evolved into a study with our hospital partners demonstrating benefits of this treatment and the decrease in mortality and morbidity of heat stroke patients. The presentation will discuss the development of the protocol and treatment guidelines, equipment developed, obstacles encountered, patients treated, prehospital data, hospital treatment, hospital data, and patient outcome.

The learning objectives are:

1. Identify factors that put individuals at risk for heat stroke and determine if a patient is a candidate for ice and cold-water immersion therapy.
2. Describe the development of the treatment guidelines, protocols, and equipment, identify obstacles to immersion treatment, and understand the procedures for placing patients in ice & cold-water immersion.
3. Discuss the effectiveness of immersion treatment, supported by prehospital and hospital data, and the implementation of the treatment into prehospital EMS systems.

Charles Finch, DO, FACOEP - charles.finch@phoenix.gov

Dr. Finch embraces his roles in clinical care, medical education and community service with compassion and commitment to excellence. He currently is a board-certified emergency physician, after completing his residency in emergency medicine at Maricopa Medical Center. He serves as the Assistant Medical Director in EMS and Training for the Phoenix Fire Department. Long dedicated to educating tomorrow's clinicians, Dr. Finch is a clinical professor of emergency medicine and chair of the Department of Integrative Medicine at Midwestern University's Arizona College of Osteopathic Medicine, where he has developed curriculum on grief and bereavement and ultrasound. He also teaches at the University of Arizona - Phoenix campus, and A.T. Still University School of Osteopathic Medicine in Arizona, along with being a presenter at local and national medical conferences.

Maki Lloyd is currently the Deputy Chief of EMS for the Phoenix Fire Department. Chief Lloyd has been with the department for 24 years and has served multiple roles in various operational and command assignments as a Firefighter, Captain, Battalion Chief, Division Chief and Deputy Chief. Chief Lloyd has been a paramedic for 23 years, is a member of the Technical Rescue Team and the Hazardous Materials Team and is a member of USAR Team Arizona Task Force 1 where he has served on multiple FEMA deployments during national disaster response(s). Chief Lloyd has been directly involved in Operations and Training throughout his career including serving as the Division Chief over training at the PFD Fire Training Academy, battalion training, and currently overseeing the EMS Division.

This is Not a Drill: Navigating Response to a Trauma Burn Disaster Incident

This presentation will offer case reviews of Trauma Burn Mass Casualty Incidents (BMCI), with a focus on understanding roles within local, regional, and national disaster plans. It will highlight the importance of pre-planning, effective communication, rapid triage, strong leadership, prioritizing patient safety, and recognizing the psychological impact of a BMCI on both patients and responders. Lessons learned will also be discussed.

The learning objectives are:

1. Review Process Associated with National Response Framework, National Disaster Medical System & National Incident Management System
2. Define Burn Mass Casualty Incident Explain Role of Burn Centers in Triage & Definitive Care
3. Identify Treatment & Transfer Priorities, Acute & Long-term Care of Burn Trauma Patients

Suzanne Buchanan, MSN, RN, CCRN - suzanne.buchanan@valleywisehealth.org

Suzanne Buchanan is with Valleywise Medical Center where she serves as the Outreach Coordinator/Educator for Arizona Burn Center. She provides education statewide, nationally, and internationally on burn/trauma adult/pediatric patient management, stabilization, and transfer of burn/trauma victims to civilians and military providers. Suzanne is also involved with reviewing burn transfers or admissions referred by burn surgeons or burn staff per Advanced Burn Life Support (ABLS) guidelines. She provides process improvement and loop closure to referring hospitals and agencies. Suzanne also assesses the need for further education on Burn transfer criteria per ABLIS guidelines. She coordinates Advanced Burn Life Support (ABLS). National ABLIS Faculty/Instructor.

Tim is currently the Emergency Management Coordinator for Valleywise Health. He has a 25-year career as a paramedic. Tim may also be found teaching a variety of healthcare and EMS continuing education courses locally and nationally.

Mark has over 13 years of nursing experience, specializing in trauma and burn care within emergency and ICU settings across the country. Beyond the hospital walls, Mark provides expert nursing support for large-scale events like Burning Man. Since 2023, Mark has served as the Clinical Practice Educator at the Arizona Burn Center, where he leads education initiatives and coordinates the center's disaster response efforts, ensuring excellence in burn care during critical moments.

Initial Evaluation of Chest Pain and the Updated Management of Acute Coronary Syndrome

Acute Coronary Syndrome (ACS) refers to a range of conditions associated with sudden, reduced blood flow to the heart, including heart attacks and unstable angina. Prompt recognition and treatment are critical to improving outcomes and reducing long-term heart damage.

This presentation will address and evaluate common causes of chest pain and the management of patients with ACS, including information from the new Acute Coronary Syndrome (ACS) guidelines.

The learning objectives are:

1. Initial evaluation of common causes of chest pain
2. Rapid diagnosis and intervention of high-risk cardiac patients
3. Understanding treatment of ACS patients and relevant guideline updates

David Prutzman, DO, FACC, FSCAI - dmprutz@gmail.com

Originally from the Northeast, Dr. Prutzman is an Interventional Cardiologist with advanced fellowship training in Structural Heart Disease. He completed his medical training in Pennsylvania, where he served as Chief Resident in Internal Medicine and Chief Fellow in Interventional Cardiology at St. Luke's University Hospital. Aside from numerous publications and presentations at national conferences, Dr. Prutzman is dually boarded in Internal Medicine, as well as Nuclear Cardiology, General and Interventional Cardiology. He specializes in the treatment of valvular and congenital heart disease, complex and high-risk coronary interventions, and peripheral vascular disease.

Gang Awareness

Falls Across the Ages

Why does gravity seem stronger at 2 am? Why do kiddos hardly break their lower c-spine? Why do some folks break a wrist while others break their face? This presentation will explore these and other questions you may wonder as you respond to these very common calls.

This presentation will also review recent research and treatments for falls, including head injuries, hips, knees, and rib injuries. Common injury patterns will be discussed to help ensure secondary injuries, that often accompany falls, are not missed.

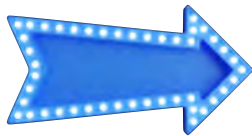

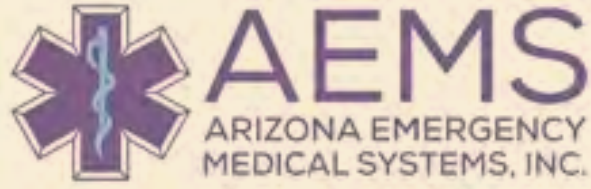
